### **New technologies and crime (*Professor Antozoe Chaidou*)**

Technology provides additional tools for social control, targeting primarily at social security and order. Such a technology-enabled control can be more effective, but at the same time risks potential violations of human rights, especially in view of insufficient guarantees and in cases of arbitrary application. Existing and emerging technologies have a significant effect on the criminal phenomenon and its management overall. On the one hand, they provide both a new framework of criminal activity and new forms of modus operandi; on the other hand, the criminal justice system benefits from new technologies in crime detection and apprehension of suspects, as well as in surveillance and treatment of offenders. All these issues are examined under thematic units such as “electronic crime”; the use of technology in traditional criminality; legislation and policy in Greece and internationally; the implementation of technological developments in the criminal justice system; and social control and human rights.
